JESUS BREAD OF LIFE

Dear Church,

Do you consider yourself to be a leader?

On Sundays this autumn, we will be looking at leaders in the Bible. Whether or not you think you're a leader, we all have areas of responsibility and oversight Maybe you have people who look up to you at work, lead a group at church, are responsible for organising your household, or manage a social group. Even just planning your own life can benefit from leadership skills and insights. Small areas of responsibility can have a huge impact.

I'll let you know a little secret about myself: I am not a natural leader. Some people are born with confidence, charisma, or a knack for decision-making. That hasn't been me. But over the years, I've been blessed with mentors who have guided me, encouraged me, and patiently shown me what godly leadership looks like. I've put myself in situations where I have to develop my skills and trust God with the work He's doing in my life. Along with that, I've found that some of the best lessons on leadership don't come from management books or motivational speakers, but from the pages of the Bible.

Of course, the best example of leadership is Jesus. He said about Himself: "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). Even the night before dying on the cross, Jesus didn't deliver a lecture on leadership theory. Instead, He got down on His knees with a towel and a basin of water (John 13). The Lord of glory took the role of a servant, washing His disciples' dusty, travel-worn feet. That's not the kind of leadership the world celebrates. But Jesus gave us an example to follow: a leader who serves.

Leadership is less about personality and more about posture. It's less about charisma and more about character. It's not about authority, but about attitude. True leadership inspires, raises up, serves, and sets the example.

Other biblical leaders echo the same truths. Moses often doubted himself, but God worked through his weakness. Gideon didn't want to lead, but his influence led to enemy armies being defeated and peace in the land. Peter stumbled many times, yet Jesus restored him and used him to start the early church. Paul led churches by pointing them not to his own strength but to the power of Christ at work in him.

So perhaps leadership isn't about being a "natural" at all. It's about following Christ, learning from His ways, and letting His Spirit shape our hearts.

The best leaders are those who serve with humility, find ways to meet needs, love with perseverance, and trust God with the results.

I'm still learning to be the leader God wants me to be. I hope you'll join me in learning from leaders in the Bible.

The Wales Window

On 15th September 1963, the Ku Klux Klan planted a bomb at the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama, killing four black girls attending Sunday School.

Due to its central location the First Coloured Baptist Church of Birmingham was one of the primary centres for the black community, where leaders like Martin Luther King and Paul Robeson regularly spoke. It became the organising centre for the local Civil Rights movement. It was after Martin Luther King's "I have a dream" speech, that Governor George Wallace said that in order to stop integration Alabama needed "a few first-class funerals". The Ku Klux Klan members planted the bomb that killed four young girls, injured several others, and wrecked the building, smashing the stained-glass windows.

News of the tragedy stirred John Petts, a stained glass artist, at his home in Llansteffan, over 4,000 miles away. He said "the news on the radio left me sick at heart, as a father I was horrified by the death of the children". He was so upset that in the end his wife told him to either do something about it or "shut up". He decided – "Could not some of us join together in a positive gesture of Christian sympathy in the face of destructive evil, and, as a token, put back at least one of those windows." He contacted David Cole, the Editor of the Western Mail, who enthusiastically took up the idea, and the next day the Western Mail launched a campaign with the headline "Alabama, Chance for Wales to show the way." It was agreed that individual donations would not exceed half a crown, "We don't want some rich man paying for the whole window. We want it to be given by the people of Wales."

Money flooded in, from churches, chapels and school children. Wales had a strong tradition of Sunday School and the thought of young girls being killed in a place of sanctuary shook the nation. The target of £500 was reached within days, and the fund closed at £900.


A telegram was sent to the Rev. John Cross: "The people of Wales offer to recreate and erect a stained glass window to replace the one shattered in the bombing of your church. They do this as a gesture of comfort and support".

A reply accepting the offer was received and stating that "Wales was the only country to offer such direct and material assistance". The window became a symbol that people around the world cared about their suffering and sacrifice, whilst those geographically closest saw them as alien and inferior.


Petts felt that his design must make an impact both simple and strong – as positive and simple as Christ's message. "Eventually one idea grew in strength: the figure of a black man, Christ, a suffering figure in a crucified gesture, with one hand flung wide in protest, the other in acceptance ... remembering the sight of a black man twisting under the assault of fire-hoses, his arms flung up. The jets of water became the bar of a Cross symbolising all violence: the street hoses of the south, the bullet streams of Sharpeville, the arrow of the spear." Patterned across the base of the design are Christ's word, "You do it to Me"-below are the words "Given by the people of Wales, UK MCMLXIV"

The design was approved and the completed window was displayed in Cardiff before being shipped to America. John Petts, David Cole and the Mayor of Cardiff sent a telegram to the dedication service on Sunday 6th June 1965:

"The thoughts of the people of Wales will be with you during your dedication service. May the Wales Window symbolise the reaffirmation of Christian love and unity." At the service pastor John Cross said that: "it might serve as a constant reminder that there are persons in the world whose hearts are filled with love and brotherly kindness."



The church has become an important historical landmark, attracting thousands of visitors, and the window is regarded as one of the key icons of the American Civil Rights Movement, a powerful protest against intolerance and injustice.
